## **ASL Placement Assessment Packet**

This packet is designed to help teachers quickly evaluate where ASL students are at the beginning of a new year, especially if they used a different program previously. The assessments cover expressive, receptive, vocabulary, grammar, fingerspelling, and self-reflection.

## 1. Conversation / Dialogue Checks

Pair students and have them sign everyday scenarios (introductions, ordering food, hobbies). Observe fluency, grammar use, clarity of signs, and comfort level.

## 2. Structured Expressive Prompts

Provide a picture or short story prompt. Have students record a signed response. Assess vocabulary recall, sentence structure, and non-manual signals.

## 3. Vocabulary Spot-Check

Flash random vocabulary words (mixed levels). Ask students to sign them. Mix in some advanced vocabulary to see what they retain.

## 4. Fingerspelling Assessment

Fingerspell 10–12 words at different speeds. Students write them down or repeat back. This measures receptive ability.

## 5. Receptive Video Quiz

Play a short Deaf signer clip (1–2 minutes). Ask comprehension questions (multiple choice, sequencing, true/false).

## 6. Silent Classroom Warm-Up

For the first week, maintain a voice-off environment. Students must navigate interactions using ASL only.

#### 7. ASL Grammar Mini-Test

Sign a few sentences with intentional grammar errors. Students identify or correct them to show grammar awareness.

#### 8. Student Self-Reflection

Students complete a checklist: - What signs/units do you remember? - What is hardest for you? - Do you prefer signing, watching, or fingerspelling?
