ASL Teacher Assessment Guide

This guide accompanies the student handout. It provides teacher instructions, suggested answers, and rubrics to evaluate expressive, receptive, vocabulary, grammar, and fingerspelling skills. Use this as a guick reference when assessing students at the beginning of the year.

1. Conversation / Dialogue

Observe: fluency, use of eye contact, turn-taking, clarity of signs, and ability to sustain conversation.

Scoring Tip: Note if the student relies too heavily on fingerspelling.

2. Expressive Prompt

Look for: correct vocabulary use, sentence structure (TOPIC-COMMENT), facial grammar, and confidence.

Scoring Tip: Consider length and clarity of response.

3. Vocabulary Spot-Check

Prepare 10–15 random words. Record correct vs. incorrect. Scoring Tip: Advanced students should demonstrate broad recall.

4. Fingerspelling

Fingerspell 10–12 words at slow and normal speed. Record accuracy. Scoring Tip: Track both receptive understanding and expressive return.

5. Receptive Video Quiz

Choose a 1–2 minute signed video. Ask 5–7 comprehension questions. Scoring Tip: Award partial credit for approximate answers.

6. Silent Classroom Warm-Up

Observe: how students adapt to voice-off. Who initiates communication? Who hesitates? Scoring Tip: Encourage peer-to-peer signing.

7. Grammar Awareness

Sign 5–7 sentences (mix correct/incorrect grammar). Examples: 'STORE I GO' (correct), 'I GO STORE' (English word order). Scoring Tip: Students should explain why errors are wrong.

8. Self-Reflection

Collect forms. Use responses to group students (strong vocabulary vs. grammar struggles, etc.).
